The meeting of the Santa Fe MPO was called to order by Dave Quintana, Vice Chair, at 1:30 pm on Monday, August 21, 2017, at the City of Santa Fe Offices @ Market Station, 500 Market Street, Suite 200, Santa Fe, New Mexico.

3. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

MOTION A motion was made by Mr. Aaboe, seconded by Mr. Martinez, to approve the agenda as presented.

VOTE The motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

4. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Ms. Martin said Mr. Escudero was shown as present when he was absent.

MOTION A motion was made by Mr. Aaboe, seconded by Mr. Martinez, to approve the minutes as amended.

VOTE The motion passed unanimously by voice vote

5. COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE PUBLIC

None.

6. ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION

1. REVIEW AND RECOMMENDATION FOR A PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE FFYS 2018-2023 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

Mr. Wilson said this information is in the packet. He reviewed the information.

Mr. Wilson said the change is to project S100250 and moves the funding from FFY 2020 to FFY 2022 and reduced the amount from \$6 million to \$5,116,193. This amendment went out for public comment. There was no public comment received. We need a recommendation from this Committee to the Policy Board.

MOTION A motion was made by Mr. Martinez, seconded by Mr. Aaboe, to recommend approval of the amendment to the Policy Board.

VOTE The motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

2. FFY2018 SAFETY TARGETS FOR NEW MEXICO

Mr. Aune said this information is in the packet. He reviewed the information.

- Mr. Aaboe asked are those stats statewide and does that detail exist at the MPO level.
- Mr. Aune said yes they are statewide and yes that level of detail does exist at the MPO now.
- Mr. Mortillaro asked where in the plan does it talk about how they are going to achieve those reductions. What specific steps will be taken.
- Mr. Wilson said as we move forward and these targets are set, we will have to justify projects as they are added what they do to satisfy congestion and reduction in traffic deaths and other types of performance measures. We have to justify those. The State will be judged on how they met these targets.
- Mr. Wilson said what is an example of the type of things that could have an effect on these factors like reducing fatalities and serious injuries.
- Mr. Wilson said the Strategic Highway Safety Plan has a high level safety focus on many areas.
- Mr. Brasher added that the emphasis will be in the design for elements of design that will increase safety. What is missing is that a lot of these accidents have to do with impaired drivers. That is beyond the scope of our design. That needs to be tackled by increased awareness and heightened law enforcement. He heard that they floated the idea that the blood alcohol content level in New Mexico should be lowered to .05. There is an eye toward safety in design.
- Mr. Mortillaro said some of this related to people's behavior that none of us can control. How do you impact that through design.
 - Mr. Brasher said that is right. Drunk and text behavior.
- Mr. Wilson said if we are not meeting our safety targets the Feds can come in and redistribute some of that funding. They can reallocate it to education and awareness. It is very rare that you have a cluster of fatalities that you can address. You see more serious injury clusters. He has been fully involved in this for awhile. The State is looking at a more data driven system for identification of hot zones.
- Mr. Patterson said the whole idea of going to these performance targets is when you develop the TIP and prioritization of projects if they have put a lot of thought into safety measures they will float to the top. All of the projects will become more data driven over time. That is the intention. It is true that some are beyond what we can address, but it is to put the attention to the forefront of projects taking more of an assertive approach.

- Mr. Mortillaro said after projects are approved will there be an attempt to see if that project met what it said it would do.
- Mr. Patterson said that is where this is headed. It is not clear how that will be done yet.
- Mr. Aaboe said some of the projects that will happen in the next 4 years are safety related. There will be an opportunity to take those that conventionally address safety as a priority.
- Mr. Patterson said those projects in the hopper were not put there with that intention but that is true.
- Mr. Aaboe said in the absence of data we don't necessarily have an understanding of where safety is a significant concern. Is a qualitative assessment that this will likely improve safety an opportunity to be addressed.
- Mr. Wilson said for crashes, data is available. Not easily available but available. The challenge we have had is the level of effort to manipulate the data to identify locations. The State has been working to make that data more available. Once hot spots are identified then you need to get the actual crash reports and that has been difficult. The State started scanning those reports so it should get easier. We are not looking to develop targets for the MPO. On these major things the more you aggregate it down the less specific you get. We are looking at adopting statewide targets and bringing the project criteria in line with those.

3. FREIGHT PLANNING UPDATE

Mr. Sittig, handed out his presentation, which is incorporated into these minutes herewith as Exhibit "1", and he reviewed it.

Chair Romero arrived at the meeting.

- Mr. Quintana asked does this additional funding take away from other programs.
- Mr. Sittig said no, it is a set aside.
- Mr. Tibbetts said St. Frances gets a lot of truck traffic. 599 is the truck route and that is stated on a sign. Are there any plans to encourage or message boards that have estimated delays going through St. Francis as opposed to 599 that will show that the time savings would be significant.
- Mr. Brasher said he doesn't know of any plans at this time but that is feasible. It would be an easy install.

Mr. Sittig said if you have any questions or concerns please contact him.

4. UPDATE ON TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM PROJECTS

Chair Romero asked Mr. Wilson if we have updates on the projects.

Mr. Wilson said he has not had time to do the updates since the July meeting. He will work on an overhaul of this list for the September meeting if that is okay.

Chair Romero said that is fine.

Mr. Tibbetts said on the Cerrillos interchange he gets questions about the weeds along the pedestrian/bike pathway. Is there a schedule maintenance program of mowing weeds there and will there be planned maintenance for that area.

Mr. Brasher said there will be. We have started mowing and will take care of that and will keep up regularly with it. There will be routine maintenance. We were hoping we could wait until the end of this month but with all the rain and growth we could not wait.

Mr. Tibbetts asked is the seeded ground cover the extent of the budget for landscaping.

Mr. Brasher said yes. The contractor will be taking care of a couple of acres where the ground was disturbed. It will be re-seeded. We do have some erosion showing up and we are keeping up with that. The contractor will be making some refinements to the bridge surface in the next couple of weeks as well.

7. MATTERS FROM THE MPO STAFF

Mr. Aune introduced the MPO's new NMDOT liaison, Soamie Chavez.




